DRUG DRIVING

This document provides some background to the law and the penalties for driving under the influence of drugs.



The law in England and Wales

It's illegal to drive, attempt to drive or be in charge of a motor vehicle with a controlled drug that exceeds the prescribed limit.

If stopped by the police:

- A roadside saliva test can be carried out to detect any drugs in your body
- And if suspected to be unfit to drive or record a positive roadside test, you can be arrested and asked to give a blood or urine test at the police station if drugs are detected you could be charged.



The penalties for drug driving

If you're convicted of drug driving you'll get:



A minimum 1 year driving ban



An unlimited fine



A maximum of 6 months in prison



A criminal record



Conviction will stay on your licence for 11 years



Your insurance costs will increase significantly



It may impact your job



Causing death by dangerous driving, under the influence of drugs, is a prison sentence of up to 14 years.



Illegal drugs and prescription medicines

The law sets limits for illegal and prescription drugs.

Examples of illegal drugs include:

- Cannabis
- Cocaine
- Ecstasy
- Ketamine

The > limits for illegal drugs are extremely low to cover accidental exposure.

Examples of prescription medicines:

- Clonazepam
- Diazepam
- Flunitrazepam
- Lorazepam
- Methadone
- Morphine or opiate and opioid-based drugs, eg codeine, tramadol or fentanyl
- Oxazepam
- Tempazepam

You can drive after taking prescription drugs if:

you've been prescribed them and followed advice on how to take them by a healthcare professional and not been advised to stop driving










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NOTE: You can be prosecuted if you drive with > certain levels of these drugs in your body and you haven't been prescribed them.
